Lackawanna Sail & Power Squadron (LSPS) is a unit of the United States Power Squadrons (USPS).

The mission of LSPS is to promote safe boating.

LSPS teaches courses on boating safety to the public at the Montville Township Public Library. In the *Boat Smart* course, students receive the certificate required to operate a power vessel or personal watercraft in New Jersey.

The next courses are:

Boat Smart—Four Wednesday nights in Montville, NJ.

How to Use a Chart—One Wednesday night in Chester, NJ.

Using GPS—One Wednesday night in Chester, NJ.

Onboard Weather Forecasting—One Wednesday night in Morris Township, NJ.

Using VHF & VHF/DSC Marine Radio—One Wednesday night in Morris Township, NJ.

LSPS teaches advanced boating courses to its members.

LSPS surveys the conditions of aids to navigation for the National Ocean Service.

There are over 150 members of LSPS. The members of LSPS reside chiefly in Morris, Union and Essex Counties. This year the officers are Art Epstein (Jersey City), Ray Nylander (North Caldwell), Rich Pfaff (Montville), Dick Aiken (Convent Station), Maureen Medure (Morristown) and Mike DiStefano (Oak Ridge).

About half of LSPS members own boats. The boats are located in New Jersey (from Toms River up to Liberty Landing), New York and Connecticut.

Approximately half of LSPS members are sailors, and half are power boaters.

Every year LSPS has two membership meetings, a festive officers' installation, and a holiday party.

LSPS has its monthly Executive Committee meetings at the Madison Community House.

LSPS members have raft-ups of boats in Raritan Bay and in Barnegat Bay.

LSPS members cruise together, often going through the East River to Long Island Sound and then beyond.

LSPS members obtain boat insurance at discounted rates, with discounts that increase as additional courses are completed.

FAQ - THE NEW JERSEY MANDATORY BOATER EDUCATION LAW

Question:

When do I have to complete a boating safety course and receive a boat safety certificate?

Answer:

If you are operating a personal watercraft (Jet Ski, Wave Runner, etc.) on the waters of the State of New Jersey you are required to possess a New Jersey boat safety certificate.

If you are operating any other power vessel and you were born in 1959 or later, you are required to possess a boat safety certificate.

On June 1, 2008, all power vessel operators born in 1949 and later will be required to possess a certificate. As of June 1, 2009, all power vessel operators, regardless of date of birth, will be required to possess a boat safety certificate.

Question:

I plan to operate a jet ski. Do I need to take a course?

Answer:

All persons operating a jet ski (personal watercraft) must have taken a course and have a NJ Marine Police certificate. Persons under 16 years of age may not operate a Jet Ski.

Question:

I heard that an "experienced boater" may not have to take a course but merely pass an exam is this true?

Answer:

An "experienced boater" has not yet been defined by the NJ State Marine Police. Such persons in the future may be able to try to pass an exam, but the exam has not yet been developed by the Marine Police. Such persons will have one chance to pass, and if they fail, will have to take a course.
